



He also was very interested in coins of the Revolutionary War period. Our thoughts go out to Susan and Steve Vargo, Don and Lana's daughter and son-in-law, and their children, who shared Don's love of living history, and the rest of his family. 

#### Fort Meigs

#### **Fort Henry Days**

Labor Day weekend once again found the North West Department at Fort Henry Days in Oglebay Park, Wheeling, West Virginia. The North West Department presented programs on rifle / musket operation in linear tactics along with an artillery demonstration. This was in addition to our participation in the recreated siege of Fort Henry.

The recreated battle this year focused more on linear tactics in the field and less on the massed firing of muskets from the fort. Members of the NWD Congressional forces were assembled as a single company of Regulars. This company took the field against a force of NWD Loyalists supplemented by a group of Native Americans. The B.A.R. Congressional forces were made up of men from: The Westmoreland County Militia, Crockett's Western Battalion, the 13<sup>th</sup> VA Regiment, Delaware Regiment and the 8<sup>th</sup> PA Regiment, both Ft. Laurens and Ft Pitt Dets. The B.A.R. Loyalists had members from the 4<sup>th</sup> NJV, 23<sup>rd</sup> Royal Welsh Fusiliers, Royal Naval Landing Party and Butler's Rangers. In all the NWD had 29 men and 5 distaff members present. The battles were spirited and well directed. The effort of the reenactors was well received by the public. The siege was reenacted on both Saturday and Sunday.

On Saturday evening we enjoyed a very nice meal of baked chicken, potato casserole, salad and deserts. For those wishing to take advantage of some nice modern amenities showers were again available.

Again this year, on Sunday morning, several of us drove to a nearby cemetery to see the grave of Samuel Brady, Captain in the 8<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment. While there we fired 3 volleys and stood on reversed arms.

At this point it has not been decided as to whether the NWD will attend in 2017.

#### TAVERN BISCUITS - AN 18<sup>TH</sup> CENTURY TREAT

Modern cookies were not invented yet in the  $18^{th}$  C., but here is a tasty and filling "biscuit" my wife makes that I have shared for years at events. Don't ask me how many years.

½ cup soft butter

34 cup sugar

2 - 3 tablespoons brandy (cherry is good, Virginians usually have peach brandy in hand)

1/4 teaspoon mace

2 ¼ cups flour

8 – 9 tablespoons milk

350 degree oven, 15 - 20 minutes

Cream butter and sugar. Add brandy and mace, then flour and milk, a spoonful at a time, to make a stiff dough. Refrigerate until dough is firm enough to roll out easily. Roll dough to an even thickness, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch or more, as it does not rise. Cut out in small circles. 3-inch circles produce about 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  dozen biscuits. Prick with a fork, and bake in a 350 degree oven about 15 – 20 minutes until they are firm. They should be brown on the bottom, but the tops remain pale.

#### **NOTES FROM THE INSPECTOR**

Someone is Always Watching

The fact that when we are at events we are always being watched isn't news to anyone in this organization. After all, isn't that why people go to historical reenactments, to see the reenactors. While we may like all the attention, it comes with a price. That price is that while we are on display, people are looking to see if we are really as authentic as we, the B.A.R., say we are.

In the opening paragraph of the Section describing the Office of Brigade Inspector in the B.A.R.'s Soldiers Manual it states that, "The standard in all matters is safety and authenticity."

Recently while at a non-B.A.R. event a non-BAR friend of mine told me that he had lost a lot of respect for the B.A.R. While I know that his statement was as much to poke fun it carried some amount of truth. When I asked him what caused this change in his attitude he told me that while he was at a NWD event he saw two things that were not correct and thought that we would know better. He proceeded to describe both instances and I agreed that we should know better, and we do. One item was an item of clothing, the other a piece of camp equipment. Before you start with the authenticity Nazi, thread counter comments, please consider that he was correct in his observation. The items in question are not correct for the time period we choose to recreate. Both of the items could have been easily corrected. The clothing item could have been made in a period manner with correct material, the piece of camp equipment could have been replaced with a period correct piece.

In the NWD we are asking all units to inspect their member's clothing and equipment. We have started this process in my unit, the 8<sup>th</sup> Pa Regiment. The results have been mostly good, but we have identified some areas where changes need to be made. And, to my pleasure many of the changes have already been completed.

Now that the season is essentially over I would ask that each individual look at his or her kit and eliminate those items that are incorrect. If you don't know or aren't sure, ask. And while you are asking, get the documentation if you can, that helps all of us.

Please remember the Firelock Matches on November 5 and 6 at the Log Cabin Shop in Lodi, Ohio. This promises to be a great event.

# The Sew & So...

I recently read a book entitled *God of Liberty* by Thomas S. Kidd, and it got me thinking about the mind-set of the American colonists in the years leading up to the Revolution. Written in 2010, it highlights the role of religion in the colonies as The Great Awakening of the 1730s (and subsequent rise of non-Anglican churches) that helped lay the groundwork for the growing spirit of independence. We are very familiar with colonial attitudes regarding taxation and dissatisfaction with English government, but the underlying foundation supplied by religion has not been emphasized before.

Kidd claims that "The Great Awakening of the 1730s and 1740s was the most profound social upheaval in colonial America." Before this time the role of the church in the private lives of the colonists had been the bedrock of their society, be they northern Puritans or southern Anglicans. Religious behavior was carefully monitored in many of the colonies as church attendance was required and taxes were collected for the support of the church. The clergy dictated moral behavior from the pulpit and even seating in church was determined by social standing. It was all quite orderly, hierarchical and rigid. But the emotion, freedom and excitement of the Great Awakening challenged all that. Controversial preachers called for new freedoms: a re-birth of spirit and society, the formation of new ways to worship, and freedom from the staid and orderly. This was a time of personal self-examination, a call to be "born again", church meetings under the trees, excitement, emotional sermons, and personal involvement in religion. It was a call to action, and it breathed a breath of self-determination into colonists who had been willing to live with the religious status quo for so long.

As time went on, the total authority of the established churches weakened. In fact, Kidd claims that "the birth of American evangelical Christianity in the 1740s resulted in the first widespread popular uprising against established authority in the history of British colonial America..."

As time went on, many equated religious liberty with civil liberty. The freedom to live as one chose under the Law of Man was equated with the freedom of spirit under the Law of God. The freedom of choice was paramount. The next step in this logic was that a church that did not allow for personal freedom threatened civil liberty.

The result was that the Roman Catholic Church, never popular with the British or her colonists, became the Antichrist. Catholics were persecuted in many colonies and reviled in others. Personal freedom of religious choice did not extend to those who followed the dictates of the hated Pope and the Roman Catholic clergy. And the Anglican Church, the offspring of the Roman Catholic Church, was also distrusted more and more. These two churches required obedience from their members, and the colonists were, more and more, seeking freedom, not obedience.

Things began to come to a head in the 1760s. The Anglican Church wanted to appoint a bishop for the colonies in order to easily ordain more clergy. But the colonists saw this as an attempt by the Church of England to re-gain lost souls, authority, and tax support. Rightly or wrongly, emotions were strong and accusations flew. The colonists were afraid that the civil bonds to England would be tightened to the point that personal freedoms would be lost. There was no place for a strong, orderly church in a society that sought freedom. The proposed appointment of a bishop was a huge threat to the colonists and became a rallying cry in the sermons and tracts of the religious "free."

The Quebec Act of 1774 was a second rallying cry for the colonists. The Quebec Act gave the French Canadians in Quebec (recently acquired from the French in the Treaty of Paris 1763) the right to worship as Roman Catholics. The colonists, especially those in New England, came to the conclusion that they would all be Roman Catholic before long.

And that was unacceptable. And feared. By mid-1774 fears about the incursion of Roman Catholicism and the intentions of the British government had reached fever pitch. Rational arguments were dismissed outright, and pastoral calls to action threatened an imminent loss of religious (and therefore civil) freedoms. Combined with dreaded taxes and a lack of adequate representation in Parliament, animosity was at an all-time high.

The mindset of docile, fairly comfortable colonists had changed. The colonists were now discontent. God was surely on their side as they argued against the loss of freedom and God-given rights. The old ways were not satisfactory. This was a time of change, and change was now desirable. Radical Patriots were able to "take command of the escalating momentum for independence."

And that brings us to the brink of Revolution. *God of Liberty* explains the role of religion during the Revolution and on to 1800. Well researched and documented, I thought it gives another dimension to the mindset of the people who moved from complacency to revolution.
